Energy Efficiency and Conservation Activities

Silver

1. The city distributed energy-efficient light bulbs to residents for \$1 each at an event called "Buck a Bulb".

Water & Wastewater Systems Activities

1. Cathedral City Watersmart Landscapes Grant Program was created to encourage and educate residents to be more responsible with water usage with their landscape.

Green Building Activities

Silver

1. There are guidelines and a 12-step document on how to make new building designs more efficient and environmentally friendly.

2. Clean Energy CV Upgrade is a program for financing building upgrades that are energy and water efficient.

Waste Reduction and Recycling Activities

Silver

1. Re-usable bag program was something the city did for a while where they provided residents free re-usable grocery bags in order to help community members be more responsible. These bags reduce the amount of wasteful plastic and paper bags normally given out by grocery stores.

Climate-friendly Purchasing Activities

Silver

1. The city received a grant and it decided to use part of the money to purchase a Vector compressed natural gas (CNG) truck, which is used to clean sewer lines. This is an environmentally responsible purchase because vehicles that size generally are harmful to the environment if they are not CNG.

Gold

2. The city has committed in their Energy Action Plan 2013 that they will continue to purchase vehicles that are energy efficient, plug in, hybrids, or natural gas running, even if they cost more money to purchase initially because they know that it will pay off in the long-run.
3. The city purchased two heavy duty natural gas vehicles and installed a CNG station with grant money totaling at \$225,000.

Renewable Energy and Low-Carbon Fuels Activities

Silver

1. With the help of Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant, the city upgraded the lighting and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems at its Civic Center and Library. These changes have reduced energy consumption in city buildings.

Efficient Transportation Activities

Silver

1. Cathedral City is now the new home of a Tesla showroom and service station. These "green" cars energy efficient and do not run on gasoline.

2. Cathedral City has implemented its first EV charging station (2 of them) that residents are able to use. The city also plans to build more in the future, but the two new stations were partially paid for by a grant that the city received.

Land Use and Community Design Activities

Silver

1. The city is proposing to redevelop two vacant lots where an Imax theater was in order to put in a two-block festival corridor in the downtown area. The development would feature two amphitheatres with stages, an outdoor art gallery, multi-use trails, and water and energy conservation exhibits.

Open Space and Offsetting Carbon Emission Activities

Silver

1. The North City area of Cathedral City is a large portion of land that is home to many different types of wildlife and vegetation. Over half the North City area is allocated to open space in support of the regional preservation effort.

Promoting Community and Individual Action Activities

Silver

1. Cathedral City partnered with three private companies to create an energy efficiency program called Community Energy Partnership. Through this partnership the city was able to distribute hundreds of energy-efficient fans to residents, go door to door in order to educate community members, and focus on helping individuals living in low-income areas.

2. The city has also partnered with the Energy Coalition in order to complete activities such as home building envelope tune-ups, halogen torchiere exchanges, and CFL giveaways.
