



Silver	1. Over 25 city employees participated in three workshops hosted by the city for the Center for Sustainable Energy's Home Energy Coach Program. The program helps employees identify and implement energy and water savings in their home. The 25 employees received over 150 LED bulbs, nearly 20 low-flow showerheads, and close to 40 thermostatic shower shut-off valves and faucet aerators. (2015)	2016
