The initiatives in energy conservation highlighted in the EAP and carried out since joining the Energy Leader Partnership Program are:         <ul> <li>Upgraded interior fluorescent lighting for 8 municipal facilities through the SCE's Direct Install Progras</li> <li>Replaced four HVAC units with high efficiency units at the Social Services facility</li> <li>Enrolled City Hall and Transportation/ Public Services facility in SCE's Critical peak Pricing Program (Demand Response Programs</li> <li>Installed a Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) for the pool pump at the Aquatic Pavilion</li> <li>Upgraded 6 high-bay interior lights at the Alondra Library</li> <li>Upgraded 88 can lights at Transportation/ Public Services facility and 57 can lights at Sproul Barn including emergency ballasts</li> <li>Implemented a Holiday Light Exchange Program, providing residents the opportunity to exchange old holiday lights for LED lights at no cost.</li> </ul> </li> </ol>	2017

Platinum	<ol> <li>Installed a Calsense smart irrigation controller in early 2016 in Ramona Park to track water usage, leak detection, and the effectiveness of water efficiency activities and programs. Realized a 35 percent decrease from the previous year's water usage (2015) and captured staff cost savings due to the automated controller.</li> <li>Installed a weather based controller (WBIC) at City Hall for use with Calsense smart irrigation controllers.</li> <li>Hosted an event to distribute almost 200 rain barrels to residents to promote water conservation and rain water reuse for landscaping.</li> <li>The city's website provides water efficient landscape design concepts as a resource to help comply with the adopted Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance.</li> <li>Installed smart irrigation controllers at Ramona Park (Nov. 2015) and City Hall for landscaping irrigation (May 2017).</li> </ol>	2017

Gold	<ol> <li>Provides 12 Mini Mr. SUN events annually. The Mini Mr. SUN Program is a neighborhood clean-up program, scheduled throughout the year at various specified areas of the community at no cost to the residents. The city provides various services including self-serve dumpsters for disposal of trash, tree clippings, furniture, large item pick-up, household hazardous waste, small batteries, and disposal of used motor oils and filters.</li> <li>The city holds an E-Waste Collection &amp; Shred-A-Thon for the community twice a year.</li> </ol>	2017

Platinum	<ol> <li>City employees are advised and encouraged to use recycled products by providing automatic substitutions through current office supply vendor when price and quality are the same as or within a reasonable cost of non-recycled products.</li> <li>The city uses Green Halo software. Green Halo Systems is an online software resource that allows the City to track, view reported construction and demolition recycling, and follow projects in real-time while ensuring compliance with recycling guidelines.</li> <li>Provides bins for collection of used batteries for proper disposal and recycling at five city facilities: City Hall, Transportation and Public Services, Senior Center, and Social Services, and Sports Complex.</li> <li>The city recycles old electronic components with a properly certified recycler, thru E-waste and Mr. Sun events.</li> <li>Returns all used copy machine ink toner cartridges, fax machine, and printer toner cartridges to the manufacturers for recycling.</li> <li>Provides presentations to local elementary schools on the importance of recycling used motor oil and oil filters. This education program includes an annual artwork contest, where the winning entries are recognized at a City Council meeting and featured on the city's website and cable channel to promote used oil recycling.</li> </ol>	Reported 2017

Platinum	<ol> <li>Purchases printing and writing papers, including all imprinted letterhead/ stationery paper, envelopes, and copy paper, etc. containing a minimum of 30 percent post-consumer recycled content.</li> <li>Purchases paper products, including janitorial supplies, shop towels, hand towels, toilet paper, corrugated boxes, file boxes, file folders, etc. and other products composed largely of paper with recycle content.</li> <li>Purchases recycled plastic products when feasible considering cost and durability.</li> </ol>

Platinum	<ol> <li>Allocated California Low Carbon Transit Operations Program (LCCTOP) funds to Cerritos Community College to support its Falcon Student Pass Program in an effort to increase ridership of the CNG transit buses (Resolution No. 15-42).</li> <li>Purchased fuel efficient vehicles to save fuel and money and reduce greenhouse gas emissions with a fleet of three Ford Fusion hybrids, 15 Toyota Prius C, four Ford CNG trucks, and 18 Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) buses. The city constructed a natural gas charging station for city vehicles in 2015.</li> <li>Effective September 16, 2015, the City of Norwalk and the Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District entered into an agreement whereby the District has agreed to purchase and the city has agreed to sell compressed natural gas (CNG) fuel for a three year term. The term may be extended upon terms and conditions mutually agreed upon by both parties in writing.</li> </ol>	2017

Platinum	<ol> <li>Provide tree planting resources and information is available in the City's website (CalFire grant).</li> <li>The city was designated a Tree City USA community by the Arbor Day Foundation for three consecutive years.</li> <li>The City increased recreational open space by acquiring 15 acres of the Norwalk Tank Farm for future expansion of Holifield Park (http://www.ci.norwalk.ca.us/i-want-to-/learn-about/tank-farm-bulletin).</li> <li>The City of Norwalk maintains two greenbelts Foster Greenbelt/ Excelsior Greenbelt, 11 parks, a skate park, Aquatic Pavilion, and Teen Center.</li> <li>City staff, seniors, students and volunteers completed above-ground planters with herbs, fruits, and vegetables at the Senior Center to promote healthy living and multigenerational collaboration.</li> </ol>	2017

Platinum	<ol> <li>The city hosts electronic waste collection, paper shredding and used motor oil filter exchange events to encourage recycling and diversion of material to landfills various times a year.</li> <li>The city provides assistance promoting energy and water conservation through the Energy Leader Partnership with Southern California Edison and the Gas Company.</li> <li>The city worked in collaboration with a local middle school to host an "I Love Trees Because" drawing contest and provided recognition to the winners in City Hall for Arbor Day activities.</li> <li>The city invites elementary school students to the National Public Works week open house, as well as to school tours at City Hall, where youth are presented with information and activities educating them on stormwater pollution prevention, recycling, energy conservation, and environmental preservation and public works functions.</li> </ol>	2017

Ten winning messages are featured in Norwalk Now newsletter, on a government access channel PSA and on the city's website.</li> <li>The city held an event to distribute almost 200 rain barrels to residents to promote water conservation and rain water reuse for landscaping.</li> <li>The city promotes available Metropolitan Water District (MWD) rebates for water conservation equipment and fixtures in Norwalk Now, One Person's Trash, city Facebook page and the city website.</li> </ol>	2017
