















#### Addendum: What This Could Mean for 2031

#### California is expected to lose 3 to 5 Congressional Districts in 2031

- □ In LA and OC 21 existing districts today only have the population for 19
  - The 2025 map adds another district to the area (CD 41)
    - If approved, 22 districts will only have enough population for 19 districts\*
      - \* Partially offset by 2025 map adding Riverside County population to CD 40
- □ Plus, in LA and OC the Commission in 2031 will likely pair 4 to 6 incumbents (all Democrats) as they undo the **2025 redistricting** 
  - Result: three to six (of the 21) LA/OC Democratic incumbents losing their seats in a Commission-drawn 2031 map
    - (Note: these are <u>not</u> Republican gains)
  - Possible pressure to "suspend" the Commission again in 2031
    - Republicans will likely highly gerrymander Texas again


