### **Energy Efficiency and Conservation Activities**

Silver

1. Through a partnership with PG&E, the City of Bakersfield retrofitted 12,856 streetlights with energy efficient LEDs, saving the city nearly \$700,000 per year.

### Water & Wastewater Systems Activities

Silver

1. The city requires that newly constructed medians utilize water-conserving landscaping alternatives, such as synthetic turf, hardscaping or xeriscaping.

## **Green Building Activities**

Silver

1. The city installed smart irrigation controllers in all parks, reduced the time and frequency of park and streetscape irrigation, and utilizes tertiary treated water for the State Farm Sports Village.

# Waste Reduction and Recycling Activities

### Silver

1. City operations accept organics from commercial businesses throughout the county in a system designed to separate plastic bags, reduce barriers to participation and increase the amount of landfill diversion tenfold while producing viable compost that is sold to nearby orchards and vineyards.

2. Bakersfield partnered with the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District to switch to electric conveyors and the use of electric blowers to induce airflow through the covered compost piles. This innovative method produces an increased volume of high-quality compost for use by the agricultural industry and reduces emissions at the facility.





## **Climate-friendly Purchasing Activities**

Silver

1. The city of Bakersfield routinely purchases recycled paper and products and implements a recycling program in all city facilities.

 The city offers expedited residential solar energy permitting and provides an inspection guide, standard plans and structural criteria to streamline the installation and approvals processes.

# Efficient Transportation Activities

### Silver

1. The city conducted public engagement for the new Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Plan via an interactive online platform. Community members shared thoughts and identified walking and biking destinations in the community directly on the webmap. The city will use these comments to develop a new Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan that builds upon Bakersfield's bicycle transportation network that interconnects miles of bike paths, lanes, and routes.

## Land Use and Community Design Activities

### Silver

1. The city is the recipient of a Transformative Climate Communities Planning Grant, which is designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through a combination of community-driven climate projects in the downtown area that link to the upcoming high speed rail station. The projects are selected and developed in collaboration with the community to address local housing, transit, urban greening, energy/water efficiency, active transportation options and more.

## **Open Space and Offsetting Carbon Emission Activities**

#### Silver

 The city partnered with Kern County to propose the Bakersfield Habitat Conservation Plan (BHCP), which is intended to provide regional conservation strategies and specific development guidelines to protect natural resources while improving and streamlining the permit process. The BHCP will support an effective and streamlined framework for agencies to conserve, protect, enhance and restore natural resources in the area addressed by the Metropolitan Bakersfield General Plan, while allowing appropriate and compatible growth and development.

# Promoting Community and Individual Action Activities

#### Silver

 The city supports Keep Bakersfield Beautiful (KBB), a community coalition of volunteers from the public and private sectors that focus on litter control and prevention, beautification, education, and volunteer recruitment. The City of Bakersfield Mayor and City Councilmembers each appoint one board member and one alternate board member to the KBB Committee.
