Some History...



#### **Capacity Building**

- ✓ Youth group builds relationships and learns to work as a team
- ✓ Youth develop skills and knowledge to lead project. This includes training in Action Research and Youth and Adult Partnerships

#### **Action Research**

- ✓ Youth choose a problem/issue to tackle
- ✓ Youth design research plan
- ✓ Youth collect data
- ✓ Youth analyze and interpret data

#### **Planning**

- ✓ Based on data, youth identify a solution to the problem/ issue
- ✓ Youth create a plan of action

#### Action/ Implementation


- ✓ Youth implement action steps aimed at achieving solution
- ✓ Youth engage in on-going capacity building and skill development

#### **Evaluation and Reflection**

- ✓ Youth reflect on internal youth team experiences
- ✓ Youth reflect on project process and impact





## 1. Mission and Values

To manage the natural resources with which the District is entrusted; to provide reliable, high-quality water and wastewater services at fair and reasonable rates for the people of the East Bay; and to preserve and protect the environment for future generations.


# 2. EBMUD Overview – Service Area

#### **Water System**

- Serves approximately 1.4 million people in a 332-square-mile area
  - From Crockett on the north, southward to San Lorenzo (encompassing the major cities of Oakland and Berkeley), eastward from San Francisco to Walnut Creek, and south through the San Ramon Valley

#### **Wastewater System**

- Serves approximately 740,000 people in an 88-square-mile area
  - Alameda and Contra Costa counties along the Bay's east shore, extending from Richmond on the north, southward to Oakland.



#### 3. EBMUD Internships - History



#### Career Intern Program (CIP) established in 1998

- Purpose was to encourage youth in water/wastewater engineering career path
- Included mentorship by EBMUD employees
- Included rotation to various engineering departments
- Paid internship starting in HS College upon graduation

#### Outcomes:


- Program helped diversify engineering workforce (gender and race) that were from our community
- Helped increase the interest into water/wastewater careers
- In short, it worked but it cost a lot

## 3. EBMUD Internship – Focus - Career Pathways for Most Critical Jobs





- Recruitment within community via Public School Districts, Community Colleges, etc.
- Targeted Outreach/Community Partnership

## **Hosted Internships – IT** Service Desk (Example)

- Advertising
  - **EBMUD Internships Page**
  - Handshake
  - Outreach to local colleges/universities
  - Career fairs
- Application on Survey Monkey
  - Required upload of resume, unofficial transcript, application, and response to supplemental questions
- Interviews via Microsoft Teams



### IT Service Desk Summer Internship



#### **Program Details**



- · Located in Oakland, CA
- 12-week program (June August, 2023)
- Approximately 30 hours per week
- Paid stipend equivalent to \$20.00/hour

#### Requirements

- High school graduation or its equivalent
- Current enrollment in a formal postsecondary information technology or related program
- Strong interest in pursuing an IT career at EBMUD and/or a similar public sector IT occupation
- Able to problem-solve and operate under infrequent supervision and resolve issues as needed
- · Able to communicate effectively and respectfully with internal customers
- Attention to detail and ability to maintain accurate written records and submit written reports

#### **Example Duties**

- Installing new laptops
- Assisting with iPhone/Multi-Factor Authentication setup
- Collecting technology assets for separating employees
- · Disposing computer hardware, including asset management
- · Assisting with basic hardware troubleshooting tickets
- Responding to requests to update internal employee directory
- Researching A/V (audio/visual) solutions for conference rooms
- Updating/creating A/V instructions for conference rooms and providing support as appropriate

- Online applications are due by 5:00pm on Friday, May 12, 2023
- Interviews will be held May 22 26, 2023 (online video conferencing)


