ELECTION RESULTS

THE PROCESS

In an innovative experiment in direct democracy and government transparency, 49th Ward Alderman Joe Moore asked the residents of the 49th Ward to decide directly how to spend his \$1.3 million capital budget for 2010. Over the past six months, 49th Ward residents identified needs, researched projects, and prepared full spending proposals.

Beginning April 5, 2010, with early voting, and culminating in an election held on April 10th, 2010, all 49th Ward residents age 16 and over, regardless of citizenship or voter registration status, were invited to vote for their favorite ward improvement projects. Each voter was entitled to vote for up to eight (8) projects. Ballots were cast by 1,652 ward residents.

Alderman Moore pledges to submit the projects that won the most votes, up to his \$1.3 million capital budget allocation, to the City of Chicago and its sister agencies for implementation. All the projects listed on the ballot are feasible, but most require final approval from the City of Chicago or its sister agencies. Though Alderman Moore pledges to request funding and advocate for the winning projects, he cannot guarantee that the government agencies will grant final approval to each and every project request.

Reasons that projects may not be approved include: interference with previously planned projects, legal restrictions, and policy decisions of the governmental entities. If one or more of the winning projects cannot be implemented for any reason, Alderman Moore will use their allocated money to recommend funding the next runner-up projects that fall within his 2010 capital budget allocation.

Most, but not all, of the funded projects will be completed in the 2010 construction season. Required project approval procedures may prevent some projects from being completed this year. Funds for projects not completed this year will be held in reserve and used to complete the projects in the following year(s). The 49th Ward is the first political jurisdiction in the nation to implement a participatory budgeting process, and if it works Alderman Moore will make it a permanent fixture in the Ward.
