DoRight Leadership Corps Involves Youth in Municipal Sustainability Assessment

Youth Partnerships Empower Municipal Sustainability Efforts

On June 3, 2008, Madeleine Skaller, 15, sat before the Town Board in Fishkill, New York, describing how she and several other youth "consultants" from the Brewster NY chapter of the DoRight Leadership Corps (DLC) would conduct their sustainability assessment of the municipal center and police station. Supervisors moved from curiosity to amazement as the Brewster High School freshman described the scope of the assessment - energy use, waste management, water, chemicals, landscaping, green building features, procurement - and an employee awareness program to motivate employees to reduce their footprints in their daily lives. She noted how DoRight "clients" were eligible for the "Plant Saver" award if they reached targeted DoRight standards, and that the Brewster chapter of the DLC had assessed over 50 businesses in Brewster to date, including the Putnam Hospital and the Queens Botanical Garden. a soon to be certified platinum LEED building. DLC youth also engaged political leaders and spearheaded public relations efforts, she explained. Fishkill Town Councilman Bob LaColla found Madeleine's presentation "amazingly professional."

Involving Youth in Community Decision Making

National League of Cities (NLC) Office of Youth Participation staffers Leon Andrews and Kate Sandel this summer addressed Maryland municipal officials on involving youth in local government.

Both speakers stressed the value of engaging youth in community activities. It helps develop young minds by providing work experience, teaching new sets of skills, promoting responsibility, bolstering confidence, empowering them and creating bonds with other youth and adult leaders. Youth who participate in community activities are also less likely to become involved in risky behavior or criminal conduct. Finally, the unique perspective that young people offer on issues affecting a community enhances decision-making when their voices are solicited, heard and considered.

Survey Explores Link Between Video Game Playing and Civic Engagement

The first national survey of its kind finds that virtually all American teens play computer, console, or cell phone games and that the gaming experience is rich and varied, with a significant amount of social interaction and potential for civic engagement. The survey was conducted by the Pew Internet & American Life Project, an initiative of the Pew Research Center, and was supported by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation.

The primary findings in the survey of 1,102 youth ages 12-17 include:

- 97% of American teens ages 12-17 play some kind of video game
- 99% of boys say they are gamers and 94% of girls report that they play games
- 76% of gaming teens play games with others at least some of the time
- · 65% of gaming teens play with others in the same room
