## Dealing with Deeply Held Concerns and Other Challenges to Public Engagement Processes

Public engagement processes are often forums for a broad spectrum of input. In some cases, public engagement participants will have very strongly held views about topics to be discussed; the local (or regional) agency and officials involved; and/or the public engagement process itself. ILG has created a free, downloadable tip sheet which includes ideas for planning and executing public engagement activities when participants are likely to have such deeply held concerns.

#### New to Public Service?

The Institute's Local Government 101 program has helpful resources for local officials, staff and media that include information about 1) the types of local agencies in California and their functions; 2) how local agencies make decisions on behalf of the communities they serve; 3) information about specific kinds of decisions, including decisions relating to finances and land use; and 4) other resources targeted to those new to public service.

### NCDD Launches Catalyst Awards Program

#### National Coalition of Dialogue & Deliberation

At their recent Seattle Conference in October, NCDD launched its Catalyst Awards to "encourage leaders and innovators in the fields of public engagement, conflict resolution and community problem solving" to work together to address challenges that are too complex to solve on their own."

### A SeeClickFix for Public Participation?

The Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs

Tools like SeeClickFix tap into the capacity of citizens to be 'intelligent sensors' of their environment, allowing them to report problems like potholes and graffiti. Can this same thinking, and some of the same technology, allow citizens to gather, track, and analyze data on public participation? A team of MPA students from the Maxwell School at Syracuse conducted exploratory research on this question, interviewing a variety of participation and evaluation experts, ranging from practitioners to evaluators and technologists. The team was supervised by Dr. Tina Nabatchi of the Maxwell School.
